SUBJECT: Declaration of Provincial Emergency

As you are aware, the government declared a <u>provincial emergency</u>, effective Thursday, January 14, 2021 at 12:01 a.m. to stop the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health and well-being of Ontarians.

The stay-at-home order requiring everyone to remain at home with exceptions for permitted purposes or activities, in addition to new and existing public health restrictions, is aimed at limiting people's mobility and reducing the number of daily contacts with those outside an immediate household. These enhanced measures do not impact the current requirements for essential visits to long-term care homes.

During the declared provincial emergency, all homes will be required to follow the applicable requirements and restrictions based on the Grey zone. Please see Table 1 below in Appendix A for an overview of requirements and restrictions.

Thank you for your continued support as we work together to reduce the spread of COVID-19 across the province.
